Executive summary

NENC ICB has continued to discharge its statutory safeguarding duties throughout 2023-24 in relation to safeguarding children, young people and adults at risk.

The Executive Chief Nurse holds the statutory accountability for safeguarding and delegated the statutory safeguarding responsibilities to the Directors of Nursing including a strategic lead with delivery of the statutory functions undertaken by the place Designated Teams. NENC ICB was able to demonstrate that there were appropriate safeguarding governance systems in place for discharging their statutory safeguarding duties and functions in line with the following key legislation:

- Care Act 2014
- Children Act 1989 and 2004
- Children and Social Work Act 2017
- Working together to Safeguard Children 2018*

The NHSE Safeguarding and Accountability and Assurance Framework (SAAF 2022) provides the strategic framework for ensuring system oversight of safeguarding priorities.

Assurance and oversight of these duties is maintained by NENC ICB through its formal quality governance arrangements

Foreword and introduction

- This is the first standalone Safeguarding Annual Review Report of North East and North Cumbria Integrated Care Board (NENC ICB)
- This report provides assurance to the board regarding our ICB safeguarding functions and outlines the continued fulfilment of our statutory safeguarding duties. Our transformational approach to safeguarding has been evolving since the ICB formation and latterly as part of our response as a result of the ICB 2.0 requirements
- Our governance arrangements continue to support a more integrated approach to safeguarding across the ICS through the Health Safeguarding Executive
- This annual report therefore contains information from 1st April 2023 until 31st March 2024 noting the 2.0 organisational change commenced in September 2023
- This report provides the Board with an overview of how we have fulfilled our safeguarding statutory requirements, our contributions across NENC ICS with our Safeguarding Children Partnerships and Adult Board arrangements and our collaboration with providers and system colleagues
- NENC ICB has a strong commitment to prevention and early intervention which is seen as vital to safeguard our children, families and adults
- NENC ICB has continued to implement national guidance, work in our convening role and driven our engagement within our
 multi agency partnerships, with a commitment to learning from safeguarding reviews and incidents to improve outcomes for
 our population across NENC whilst holding the voice of our population central to our focus and delivery



Safeguarding Governance Arrangements 2023/24

Safeguarding arrangements are within the overarching NENC ICB quality governance structure. The ICB hosts a strategic Health Safeguarding Executive Group for senior NHS leaders in providers.

The structure supports an integrated model for the delivery of the safeguarding functions with the opportunity for continuing development during 2024/25.

There is a clear line of accountability with the Executive Chief Nurse taking overall responsibilities for the organisations safeguarding arrangements. The recent organisational change has provided the opportunity to review and develop safeguarding governance to support a model of integrated safeguarding systems, oversight and aims to reduce duplication, promote effectiveness, and demonstrating improved outcomes at scale.

- There are 22 safeguarding partnerships and boards across the NENC ICS footprint, seven of which are joint
- The Executive Chief Nurse has ensured the ICB statutory function for the boards and partnerships during 2023-24 has been delivered via the following arrangements:
 - ✓ Area Director of Nurses have attended the Safeguarding Board/Partnership meetings with delegated executive responsibility from the ICB Executive Chief Nurse
 - ✓ Our Designated Safeguarding teams in each place have attended the Board/Partnership meetings as expert advisors. They have also either chaired or provided representation to facilitate and influence the subgroups of the partnerships/boards and associated workstreams to fulfil our statutory responsibilities and contribute to our safeguarding partnership work

- ✓ Community Safety Partnerships are attended by our Designated teams in each place to represent our ICB organisation and fulfil our statutory responsibilities regarding domestic abuse, serious violence and Prevent
- ✓ As a statutory partner we contribute to each of our safeguarding partnership/boards annual reports which outline our key achievements and priorities for each of the partnership areas
- ✓ Our ICB safeguarding and quality governance routes from within each place and within our wider ICB governance ensure our continued oversight and contribution to the work of our partnerships and boards is maintained

Safeguarding Assurance - Overview

NENC ICB has a statutory responsibility for ensuring safe systems of care are delivered and to ensure that all health providers with whom they commission, discharge their functions regarding safeguarding and the promotion of welfare of children, young people and adults at risk. The statutory safeguarding assurance processes set out in the SAAF (2022) have been adhered too.

NENC ICB Contractual Standards provide the safeguarding audit framework used to monitor all NHS and Non-NHS providers of health care and ensure annual safeguarding arrangements are in place to provide oversight of provider safeguarding assurance.

NENC ICB Safeguarding Teams oversee the coordination of system safeguarding assurance in coordination with contracting, commissioning and quality teams.

Our Safeguarding assurance model for NHS commissioned services includes actively engaging and seeking assurance from our large acute trusts, Private Hospital Trusts, GP Practices and Nursing Care Homes as well as numerous smaller commissioned or independent services.

Assurance of ICB's is overseen by NHS England who have a statutory role to oversee assurance.

Formal NHSE ICB assurance reviews are carried out quarterly via the Safeguarding Commissioning Assurance Toolkit (SCAT). The organisation is fully compliant across all standards.


Safeguarding Statutory Reviews: 1 April 2023 to 31 March 2024

ICB's are required to participate in all statutory safeguarding reviews, Safeguarding Adult Reviews (SARs), Child Safeguarding Practice Reviews (CSPR's) and Domestic Homicide Reviews (DHR) as outlined within legislation including the Care Act (2014), The Children and Social Work Act (2017) and Domestic Violence, Crime and Victims Act (2004).

The ICB contributes to all reviews via our Designated Safeguarding Teams across NENC ICB as part of the Safeguarding Adult Boards, Children Partnerships and Community Safety Partnerships review panel processes.


Learning from these reviews informs local partnerships and system level development and improved outcomes for our population – the aim is to identify thematic areas of learning to influence our ICS system, regional and national priority areas of work. During 2023-24 NENC ICB 45 statutory reviews were commenced with a total of 77 underway.

Serious Violence Duty

The Police, Crime, Sentencing and Courts Act received Royal Ascent in April 2022. The Serious Violence Duty (SVD) requirements came into effect in January 2023, they introduced a new statutory duty for specified authorities in a locality to collaborate to prevent and reduce serious violence. NENC ICB is the specified authority for health in each ICB area and needs to ensure services work together to share data and knowledge and to target interventions to prevent serious violence.

Child Death Overview Panels

- Child Death Review [CDR] partners have a legal responsibility to ensure that the deaths of children
 normally resident in their area are reviewed. This function is carried out by the Child Death Overview
 Panel (CDOP) to ensure that a review is undertaken for all infant/child deaths age 0-17 years,
 excluding babies who are stillborn, late foetal loss and planned terminations of pregnancy carried out
 within the law
- The four CDOPs across NENC ICB use an eCDOP system that supports the 14 local authorities. It allows sharing of information in order to build a picture of emerging themes and patterns
- Paediatrician for Child Deaths and Designated Doctors fulfil the ICB responsibilities as members of the four CDOPs
- CDOP has a statutory requirement to produce local annual reports which provides a summary of the key learning and emerging trends arising with the aim of preventing future child deaths which will be reviewed through the NENC ICS Health Safeguarding Committee and ongoing governance

Role and key achievements led by Designated Doctors in 2023–24


Designated Doctors lead the ICB clinical arrangements for Safeguarding Children, Care Experienced and Paediatricians for Child Death

All the roles are statutory and work within each of the safeguarding teams – they ensure that the health economy is working effectively to safeguard children and working effectively with partner agencies. They provide support and advice to health care professionals, advocacy and the provision of strategic advice and guidance for the commissioning of cared for services and clinical leadership for the review of child deaths.

Key areas of achievement 2023-24

- Developing safer sleep training programme based on Eyes on the baby pilot in County Durham
- Working with local partnership on guidance for managing Fabricated and Induced Illness
- Working with local partnership on managing sexualised behaviour
- Developing local guidance on Injuries in non-mobile children
- Supported bid and development of role for Emergency Department navigators for violence reduction at South Tees aged 14-25
- Developing and delivering training sessions for multiagency partners
- A proforma has been developed for Unaccompanied Asylum-Seeking Children in Durham to help ensure the specific health needs of our unaccompanied young people are identified and met.
- Work underway in Newcastle to develop a page on the NENC ICB Healthier Together website, initially to provide information on the Initial Health Assessment process for those children coming into care with the aim of expanding the content linked to the health offer




Safeguarding and Cared for Teams in NENC ICB

Priorities and Ways of Working 2024/2025

- Provide strategic leadership, influence and support for our ICB safeguarding arrangements and strengthen and improve the quality of safeguarding across the ICS system within partnerships and local delivery teams
- Continue to deliver our statutory responsibilities and those outlined within the SAAF (2022) for Safeguarding (Children, Cared for Children and Adults) on behalf of the ICB. (New SAAF expected)
- · Ensure the voices of people remain central to safeguarding across the ICB and the wider safeguarding system
- Continue to progress improvements in the four workstreams focussing on our Joint Forward Plan priorities
- Strengthen governance and reporting mechanisms to our Boards and partners with underpinning dashboard
- Develop and embed a model of restorative supervision for ICB safeguarding practitioners
- Create a more interactive space on the ICB website to publicise our training and supervision offer, best practice and engagement opportunities
- Develop systems to embed learning from statutory reviews particularly where ICB wide themes have been identified
- Develop an ICB wide assurance and audit plan to support the NHSE Safeguarding Commissioning Toolkit (S-CAT) and Looked After Children data set returns
- Continue to review workforce skills and capacity in line with the Intercollegiate Guidance and undertake a detailed workforce survey to inform our workforce plans
- Continue to review all our safeguarding and cared for commissioned services and arrangements to maximise the more strategic opportunities afforded by the ICB ways of working

Conclusion

During the period covering the scope of this report - 2023/2024 – it has been a time of significant change within the ICB including the increased delegated responsibilities for specialised commissioning, primary care, dental and pharmaceutical, general ophthalmic and dentistry services and the reorganisational requirements in relation to running cost reductions.

The legislative and national safeguarding requirements including the Serious Violence and Domestic Abuse Acts and the revised Working Together (2023) guidance amongst others have continued the requirements for the ICB to respond to effectively and provide assurance that it continues to meet its statutory requirements.

This first standalone Safeguarding Annual Report provides assurance that despite all these changes that the ICB has continued to discharge its statutory safeguarding duties throughout 2023-24 in relation to safeguarding children, young people and adults at risk.

The report builds on the ICBs commitment to provide system leadership across the Integrated Care System, to work closely in partnership at all levels and to embrace the opportunities of a more integrated approach to our ways of working as demand for safeguarding services continues to increase

Our aim is to continue to embed safeguarding in all elements of our strategic planning and provision of services and continue our transformational work to improve outcomes for our population.
