Report Title:	NENC ICB Procurement Strategy	

Purpose of report

This procurement strategy sets out some key objectives to support the ICB's priorities and ambitions to reduce inequalities, improve experiences of our health and care services and improve the health and wellbeing of people living and working in the North East and North Cumbria.

Key points

This is a new procurement strategy since the procurement team joined NENC ICB on 1 April 2025.

There have been so many changes to Procurement legislation over the last 18 months, it is important to reflect how we can utilise the flexibilities allowed to create opportunity for innovation and improvement to healthcare services.

This strategy focuses on utilising procurement processes and continuous lessons learned:

- to improve population health, delivering the best quality for patients and ensuring providers work to the same ethos as the ICB.
- to reduce inequalities and support the local economy.
- to focus on prevention and supporting the wider objectives of the ICB.
- and drive efficiencies where appropriate specifically for non-healthcare procurements.

The Executive Committee recommended the approval of the Strategy to Board.

Risks and issues

The Board should note that this strategy aims to support the overall strategic aims and objectives of the ICB and is aligned to the future operating model of the ICB. However, there is a potential risk to deliver against timescales should there be change in direction of the operating model of the ICB and at this point in time no structures or resources are confirmed.

Assurances and supporting documentation

The Board can be assured that the procurement team have the skill set and drive to deliver this strategy, with the caveat on the risk of resources to deliver as above.
