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#### Who is eligible for the MMR vaccination?

The MMR vaccine protects against measles, mumps and rubella and is part of the routine NHS childhood vaccination schedule.

While it's recommended for all babies and young children, older children and adults can still be vaccinated if they missed out when they were younger.

Babies and young children

Children need two doses of the MMR vaccine for full protection. These are usually given at:

- 1st MMR 1 year of age
- 2<sup>nd</sup> MMR 3 years and 4 months (pre-school booster)\*

\*From 1 January 2026, the 2<sup>nd</sup> MMR vaccination schedule will change as follows:

- For children born from 1 July 2024 onwards, the second MMR dose will now be given at 18 months of age.
- Children born before 1 July 2024 will receive their second dose at age 3 years 4 months.

In some cases, babies between 6 and 12 months may be offered an early dose of the vaccine. This can happen if:

- They are travelling abroad to a country with high levels of measles
- They have been in close contact with someone who has measles
- There is a local outbreak of measles

This early dose does not replace the routine doses and may be followed by the usual schedule.

#### Older children and adults

The MMR vaccine can be given at any age. If you didn't receive it as a child, only had one dose, or aren't sure of your vaccination status, speak to your GP surgery – they can check your records or offer the vaccine if needed.

It's especially important to be vaccinated if:

- You are a child, teenager, or young adult
- You are planning a pregnancy



- You're travelling to or living in a country where measles, mumps or rubella are more common
- You are a healthcare worker
- You were born between 1970 and 1990 you may not have received protection against all three diseases

If you were born before 1970 and have not had measles, mumps or rubella (or the vaccines), you can still ask your GP about having the MMR vaccine.

The MMR vaccine is free on the NHS and provides long-lasting protection.

If you're unsure whether you, or your child, are fully vaccinated, check your Red Book or speak to your GP surgery. It's never too late to catch up.



#### **Key messages MMR**

- UKHSA have reported an increase in measles cases in the UK
- Parents and carers are encouraged to check that they and their children have had two doses of the MMR vaccine
- The MMR vaccine is free, safe and effective at protecting measles, mumps and rubella
- Children should receive the MMR vaccine:
  - Frist dose at 1 year of age
  - o Second dose (pre-school booster) at 3 years and 4 months
- If your child or a young person missed these vaccinations, contact your GP practice
- Check your child's Red Book or speak to your GP practice if you're unsure of their vaccination status
- If you or your child develop symptoms of measles, stay at home and contact your GP or NHS 111 for advice
- Symptoms to look out for:
  - High fever
  - o Sore, red, watery eyes
  - Cough
  - o Aching and feeling generally unwell
  - o A blotchy rash that usually appears after the initial symptoms
- Rash is typically brown or red on white skin
- May be harder to spot on brown or black skin



#### **Short copy MMR vaccine**

Measles is serious – and can be deadly.

To stop measles from spreading, at least 95% of children must be fully vaccinated. Sadly, rates across the North East and North Cumbria are below this target.

The best protection for your child is the MMR vaccine. It's safe, effective, and protects against measles, mumps, and rubella.

Children need two doses:

- First at 12 months
- Second at 3 years and 4 months\*

Vaccinating your child also protects others – especially those who have low immunity due to illness.

If you're unsure about your child's vaccines, check their Red Book or speak to your GP. It's never too late to catch up.

Please don't wait. MMR saves lives. Let's protect our children – and each other.

Be wise, immunise.

\*From 1 January 2026, the MMR vaccination programme is changing:

- For children born on or after 1 July 2024, the second MMR dose will now be given at 18 months of age.

#### **Longer copy MMR vaccine**

Measles is not just a childhood illness, it's a serious disease that can lead to severe complications, and in rare cases, can be fatal.

The best protection against measles is the MMR vaccine, which also protects against mumps and rubella. The vaccine is safe, effective, and provided free of charge on the NHS.

To be fully protected, children need two doses of the MMR vaccine:

- First dose at 12 months
- Second dose at 3 years and 4 months\*

To stop the spread of measles in our region, at least 95% of children need to be fully vaccinated. Unfortunately, vaccination rates across the North East and North Cumbria are currently below this target, putting more children at risk of catching and spreading measles.

By vaccinating your child, you're not only protecting them, you're also helping to protect others in your community, especially those who can't be vaccinated or who have weakened immune systems due to illness or medical treatment.

If you're not sure whether your child has had both doses of the MMR vaccine:

- Check their Red Book (Personal Child Health Record)
- Or contact your GP surgery for advice

It's never too late to catch up – even if your child has missed a dose, the vaccine can still be given.

Please don't wait. MMR saves lives. Let's protect our children – and each other. Be wise, immunise.

\*From 1 January 2026, the MMR vaccination programme is changing:

• For children born on or after 1 July 2024, the second MMR dose will now be given at 18 months of age.



• Children born on or before 30 June 2024 (aged between 18 months - 3 years and 4 months) will stay on the current schedule.



#### How to book your MMR vaccine

The MMR vaccine, which protects against measles, mumps and rubella, is routinely offered to all children in the UK.

Your GP surgery will usually get in touch with you when your child is due for their MMR vaccinations. This may be by letter, text message, phone call or email.

The first dose is given at 1 year, with a second dose offered as a pre-school booster at around 3 years and 4 months.

From 1 January 2026, the MMR vaccination programme is changing:

- For children born on or after 1 July 2024, the second MMR dose will now be given at 18 months of age.
- Children born on or before 30 June 2024 (aged between 18 months 3 years and 4 months) will stay on the current schedule.

If your child missed one or both doses, it's important to catch up. You can contact your GP surgery at any time to arrange a catchup appointment.

The MMR vaccine is free on the NHS and provides lifelong protection for most people.

If you're unsure whether your child is up to date, check their Red Book or contact your GP surgery.

# 'It's never too late to catch up' – parents and carers urged to protect their children with MMR vaccine

Parents and carers are being remined that 'it's never too late to catch up' and urged to ensure their children have both doses of the MMR vaccine to avoid the 'real risk' of a measles outbreak.

This comes after a warning from the UK Health Security Agency (UKHSA) that, without increased uptake of the MMR (measles, mumps, and rubella) vaccine, measles could spread rapidly, leading to an outbreak of the vaccine preventable disease.

Measles is extremely contagious - spending just 15 minutes in the same room as an infected person is often enough to catch it. Most people who are not immune, and who come into contact with someone with measles, will catch measles.

Complications can be severe, including pneumonia, blindness, deafness, and brain swelling.

For Scarlett and Dan Jones, from County Durham, the danger became real when, while living in Cheshire last year, their seven-month-old daughter Saskia suddenly fell ill.

Too young to have had her first MMR jab, Saskia developed red, swollen eyes, a fever of 39.4°C and was struggling to breathe. She was rushed to hospital, where she needed oxygen and intravenous fluids.

"It was terrifying," Scarlett said. "The doctors initially thought that it could be meningitis, it took a while for them to diagnose measles as they had never seen a case of it before.

"We want all parents to know just how important the MMR vaccine is – not just for their own children but for those who are still too young to have it."

Saskia's two-year-old brother Theo, who had been vaccinated, did not catch the virus and Saskia was finally discharged from hospital, to recover at home, once her symptoms had become stable. The family's experience shows just how vital it is to keep vaccination rates high to protect the most vulnerable.



Children need two doses of the MMR vaccine, the first around their first birthday and the second at three years and four months\*\*, for full protection. Yet uptake of the second dose has slipped below the national target of 95%.

Dr Catherine Monaghan, medical director for the North East and North Cumbria Integrated Care Board, said: "Measles is one of the most infectious diseases in the world – and it is entirely preventable through the MMR vaccination.

"Ensuring your children are properly immunised is one of the most important things you can do to protect their health.

"Here in the North East and North Cumbria uptake of MMR remains high overall, but we can't be complacent because low rates in some areas could leave room for outbreaks and frightening cases like Saskia's.

"If your child has missed any doses, it's never too late to catch up.

"The MMR vaccine is safe, free, and offers the best protection for your child – please don't leave your child unprotected - act now!"

\*\*From 1 January 2026, changes to the MMR vaccination programme will mean that children born on or after 1 July 2024 will receive their second dose at 18 months of age, while those born on or before 30 June 2024 will continue to have their second dose at 3 years 4 months.

All parents and carers are urged to check their child's "Red Book" Personal Child Health Record or, if they are still not sure, to contact their GP practice to check if their children are fully vaccinated.
